
TOUR 10 Garden in the Woods at Native Plant Trust. 180 Hemingway Rd. Framingham.

SHORT TOUR LAYOUT. This tour is for a maximum of 20 GS2023 conference attendees. It is about 2 hours long and includes 2 miles of walking. There is a \$10 per person charge assigned to this tour. The normal charge is \$20, but a local Foundation has made this discount available to GS2023 attendees. This location is 15 to 20 minutes from AmVets.
